

SUMMARY:

At the Council meeting on October 24, 2019, staff shared that the Institute for Child & Family Health, Inc. (ICFH) had their accreditation suspended by Nonprofits First due to a significant loss of revenue and concerns about fiscal stability. On November 22, 2019, Nonprofits First made the decision to revoke ICFH's accreditation. On December 3, 2019, ICFH exercised their right to request an Administrative Review Process, and on December 12, 2019 Nonprofits First issued a final decision, upholding the revocation of ICFH's accreditation. ICFH is one of many CSC providers that are contractually obligated to obtain and maintain Nonprofits First accreditation. Pursuant to CSC policy, CSC will be terminating the contract with ICFH effective March 11, 2020.

ICFH is currently one of three providers funded by the Council to provide the Child First program. The other two providers are Center for Child Counseling, Inc. and Families First of Palm Beach County. Both aforementioned agencies have expressed an interest in absorbing the ICFH Child First program.

CSC's goal staff is to ensure continuous service for the families currently served by ICFH. In light of an ongoing evaluation and the cost and time involved with training and installation of the Child First Program, CSC staff developed a selection process, where both agencies will have the opportunity to submit an application to absorb the ICFH Child First program. By working with the existing providers, we hope to reduce the disruption to the families in service, while preserving the extensive investments made to train staff and install the program.

As part of the application, the providers will detail their capacity to take on the program, as well as their plans for a successful transition. The review process will also consider the agencies' history of performance and their current standing with Nonprofits First and the Child First National Program Office. The deadline for submission of the application is February 5, 2020. After a review period, the selected agency will receive notification of a decision by February 14, 2020. An agenda item will be submitted to Council for approval at the February 27, 2020 Council Meeting. If approved, an amended contract will be effective on March 01, 2020.

SUMMARY:

Since 2008, most CSC funded agencies have been contractually required to obtain and maintain accreditation with Nonprofits First, Inc. On October 22, 2009, the Council approved a Resolution (#09-027) and a corresponding Council Policy relating to Nonprofits First, Inc. accreditation suspension and revocation. The policy is rarely invoked as most agencies maintain their accreditation and those few that are suspended are usually able to remedy the issue and regain their accreditation.

Recently, an agency did have their accreditation revoked, which brought to light the need to update Resolution #09-027 and the corresponding policy. The proposed changes are not substantive in nature. Rather, changes are needed to update terminology and ensure conformity between the Resolution timelines and the policy timelines.

The Resolution and the policy will continue to require that agencies are given up to 90 days to regain their accreditation. The agency will also be placed on a corrective action plan concurrent with the suspension period. If accreditation is permanently revoked, the CSC agreement(s) or contract(s) with the agency will be terminated within 90 days of the final decision by Nonprofits First, Inc.

The revised Council policy is attached at Exhibit "A".

EXHIBIT "A"

CSC Policy on Agency Accreditation Suspension and Accreditation Revocation

CSC funded agencies whose accreditation is suspended for failure to meet Nonprofits First, Inc. (NPF) will generally be given 90 days to regain their accreditation.

Concurrent with the suspension period, the agency will be placed on a CSC Corrective Action Plan based on contract non-compliance. The Corrective Action Plan will clearly advise the agency that failure to achieve accreditation reinstatement will lead to termination of the agency's contract(s).

CSC staff will notify the Council at the first meeting held after an agency is notified of a suspension. CSC staff will update the Council at the next regularly scheduled Council meeting when/if accreditation is reinstated and when/if accreditation is revoked. The Council will also be advised as to the contract termination date, in the event of final accreditation revocation. CSC staff will also notify the agency verbally and in writing that their contract will terminate effective 90 days after accreditation revocation (including the administrative review/appeal period).

On occasion, Nonprofits First, Inc. may provide for a shorter period of suspension of accreditation. In this instance, the CSC policy will conform with Nonprofits First, Inc. time periods.

In the event of final accreditation revocation, CSC staff will work with the agency to transition services as smoothly as possible. This could be through a transfer of clients to another CSC contracted agency or thorough a competitive solicitation.

Chief Executive Officer Report

Program Updates

Head Start Match Funding Update for FY 2019

In May 2014, the Council approved an agreement with the Palm Beach County Commission whereby CSC would gradually assume responsibility for the local funding of Early Head Start and Head Start, and the County Commission would increase their funding of evidence-based/promising programs for youth and young adults. The financial obligations of the agreement were as follows:

Annually, CSC staff receives reports from the Palm Beach County Youth Services Department (PBCYSD) describing how the County commitment was met for each fiscal year. For example, in FY 2019 almost 40 programs/projects received funding through PBCYSD. Funding has been provided for a variety of new programs/initiatives, including:

- Expansion of mentoring programs
- New teen employability initiatives for disconnected youth
- Expansion of middle school afterschool programming
- Expansion of Summer programming
- New social-emotional wellness initiatives
- Trauma-informed care training and services.

These programs are consistent with the Interlocal Agreement between Palm Beach County and CSC in providing new programs with a focus on youth and young adults.

Through the end of FY 2019, the PBCYSD expended 93% of the total \$10,1000,000 committed in the Interlocal Agreement. The Council previously approved a one-year extension of the agreement to allow the County to fulfill its commitment through FY 2020. Ongoing funding for many of the PBCYSD funded initiatives will enable the remaining \$323,058 commitment to be easily reached and exceeded.

Community Based Participatory Action Research, Possible Future Project

CSC is a partner with Palm Health Foundation (PHF) on their Brain Health Initiative as well as BeWell, a local initiative that is engaging the community's residents, systems and sectors to address the county's behavioral health needs collectively, with the promise that we can do better for our children, families and neighbors. PHF has established a Brain Health Innovation Fund, with the goal of investing \$1 million annually in innovative efforts to support brain health. Southeast Florida Behavioral Health Network has committed to partnering and both

Quantum Foundation and CSC have been invited to participate. As the Brain Health Innovation Fund develops, the funding will be available to support a number of projects; partners will support those projects that are best aligned with their areas of interest, mission and resource availability.

One of the initial projects under consideration is Community Based Participatory Action Research (CBPAR). CSC is interested in this area as it ties in well with the exploration and efforts underway around system governance, community-based supports, community assessment, resident-led grantmaking, and equity framework for research. One of the possible action research questions centers on trauma and toxic stress, focusing on community conditions that contribute to these issues as well as those community conditions that mitigate its impact on families and young children.

CBPAR requires two significant stakeholders: (1) the community and (2) researchers. To be successful, a CBPAR should have the following elements:

- Relevance of research topics is identified or verified by community participants;
- Community participants are experts;
- Resources are shared;
- Utilizes the expertise of all at all stages of research;
- Driven by values: empowerment, supportive relationships, social change, continuous learning, and respect for diversity; and
- Results are accessible and understandable to all.

(University of California, Riverside, School of Medicine)

The actual community in which to focus the project has not been identified; the preliminary plan is to target a community that has both a BRIDGES and a Healthier Together collaborative, and where the community has already expressed interest in issues around behavioral health.

Relative to the area of interest, PHF has held initial conversations with Dr. Julie Servoss from FAU Medical School and Dr. Roderick King, Florida Institute on Health Innovation and University of Miami Medical School.

It takes time, energy and resources to explore the concept of a CBPAR and arrive at a community decision on whether to pursue a project, the actual scope of the action research, and how to partner with the research organization(s). To ensure a thorough planning stage, CSC will be committing funds to cover the cost of meeting logistics, stipends and other supports to ensure community residents are able to fully participate, and any consulting resources needed by the community and other stakeholders to design an effective project. Funding is available within the Program Strategy Budget and the amount of resources to support the planning phase are within the CEO's approval level. Based on what the community ultimately determines, CSC may also provide funding to support the implementation of CBPAR. Funding requirements for the implementation phase, and its associated scope, would be brought to the Council for approval.

Cost-Benefit of Outcome Achievement for the Community Voice Program

In 2018, CSC's Evaluation Department conducted an evaluation of the Community Voice Program. The results of the evaluation showed a significant improvement in birth outcomes after implementation of the program in the zip codes where Community Voice had been operating. In addition, the evaluation showed that improvement in birth outcomes in the zip codes in which Community Voice was implemented was greater than comparable zip codes in Broward.

After reading the Evaluation, Patrick Bernet, Professor of Healthcare Finance at Florida Atlantic University, requested to conduct an independent study focusing on the cost savings to the community because of the improved birth outcomes. The study focused solely on the expenditures attributed to Community Voice, so

although the positive birth outcomes that occurred cannot be solely attributed to Community Voice the costbenefits are based on the monies expended through Community Voice.

He conducted the study in the summer of 2019 and the study documented the following results.

- Since the program's inception from 2009 through 2016, \$4,119,347 was expended on the program. His research showed that the positive birth outcomes in the Community Voice zip codes resulted in a savings of \$621 per birth. There were 10,341 births in the Community Voice zip codes over that period for a total savings in the Community Voice zip codes of \$6,419,292.
- The difference in total savings over total expenditures was \$2,299,945 since the implementation of the program in the Community Voice zip codes.
- Every \$1.00 spent on the Community Voice program resulted in a return of \$1.56 or a 56% return on investment.

This study shows that investing in a program like Community Voice that focuses on health education and positive birth outcomes can not only result in better birth outcomes for the zip code in which the program is implemented, but also results in a significant cost savings to the community overall.

Annual Comprehensive Program Performance Assessment (CPPA) Results

The Annual Comprehensive Program Performance Assessment (CPPA) is one of several assessments utilized to evaluate Providers' performance and compliance with contracted deliverables and established targets and outcomes. The main areas of review in the CPPA assessment include program implementation and fidelity, program operations and outcome achievement. CPPA is conducted at least once a year and is used with other financial, administrative and programmatic tools for accountability and continuous quality improvement.

The CPPA tool is scored on a scale of 1 to 100. In addition to the general CPPA tool, we also have an abbreviated version named CPPA short form. The short form CPPA is used for programs that do not have a specific program model design. Rather, CSC is contracting for unique services such as transportation, or a more specific purpose such as funding for scholarships to support professional development needs of early childhood educators. The CPPA short form is not scored. Nonetheless, the tool serves to examine compliance with contract deliverables.

CPPA Scoring:

There are three possible scores:

Green: Score of 90 or above	Yellow: Score between 89 and 75	Red: Score below 75
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Programs scoring in the yellow range may be placed on progressive intervention through either a performance improvement or corrective action plan. There are three possible levels of progressive intervention depending on the severity of the performance issue involved. In situations where Providers score in the red, the results are brought to the Council for approval of termination of the contract.

Results for Fiscal Year 2018-19:

For fiscal year 18-19, the Council evaluated 57 programs in full implementation:

18 programs were evaluated using the short form. All 18 programs were in compliance.

39 programs were evaluated using the scored version of CPPA. Of those, 38 had a result in the green and 1 had a result in the yellow.

The program with a result in the yellow is Wyman's Teen Outreach Program (TOP) implemented by the Urban League of Palm Beach County with a score of 82.5. The score is a reflection of administrative and programmatic items identified early in the contract year.

At this time, the Provider has already implemented corrective action to address the issues of concern. As a result, a progressive intervention plan is not recommended at this time.

CPPA Tool Refinement:

Refinements to the CPPA tool have continued during the 2018-2019 fiscal year with a goal of incorporating qualitative items and more of a focus on programmatic elements, particularly with an emphasis on participant engagement, participant feedback and outcome achievement.

2019 Great Ideas Initiative Highlight

In 2016, CSC launched the Great Ideas Initiative to acknowledge and support nonprofits in the community doing great work to help youth grow up healthy, safe and strong. In 2019, CSC issued its fourth year of funding for GII to organizations with annual operating budget of less than \$1 million. Sixteen organizations were awarded up to \$35,000 each, for a total of \$489,008.92 in funding. Community Greening, co-founded by Mark Cassini and Matt Shipley, is one of the 16 awardees.



Trees improve our lives in many ways that we don't often think about: cleaner air and water, energy savings, higher property values, food production, reduced flooding, and improved mental health to name a few. Increasingly cities around the country are adopting tree planting campaigns to mitigate the numerous risks associated with a warming planet. Unfortunately, everyone doesn't experience the benefits of trees equally. Minority neighborhoods with lower average incomes have far fewer trees than neighborhoods with higher incomes.

Community Greening, an urban forestry non-profit based in Delray Beach, is a collective effort to improve the environment for people and nature. The organization promotes an engaged community creating sustainable greenspaces and a vibrant tree canopy to equitably strengthen our environment, economy, society, and health. Since 2016, Community Greening has planted more than 3,300 trees with 3,000 volunteers of all ages in parks, schools, residential yards, and vacant lots. Since environmental amenities disfavor racial and ethnic minorities with lower incomes, their programming prioritizes these neighborhoods.



Community Greening's Great Idea is to start a Youth Tree Team to employ local teens to plant trees in their neighborhood and teach them to be good environmental stewards of the land. Community Greening will recruit Youth Tree Team members from The Set in Delray Beach. The West Settler's District, known as The Set, is home to the majority of Delray's minority population and one fifth of Delray's overall population. The neighborhoods in this District have a 15% tree canopy coverage compared to double that in other neighborhoods. Beginning in the Summer 2020, selected teens will learn job skills by planting trees, maintaining green spaces, conducting community outreach, and attending outdoor enrichment activities. When the Youth Tree Team comes together to plant trees, they are not only improving the community, they are building community.

Community Greening was recently named the "Non-Profit of the Year" by the Delray Beach Chamber of Commerce and the "Tree Advocacy Group of the Year" by the Florida Forest Service.

Child First Presentation at 2019 Florida Summit



Kathleen Alexis, Specialty Court Coordinator, Early Childhood Court, Fifteenth Judicial District, Clarissa DeWitt, Clinical Director for the Child First Program with the Center for Child Counseling, Laura Fleischman, Ph.D., CSC Evaluation Officer, Mary Peniston, Chief Program Officer, Child First, Inc. presented a panel at the 2019 Child Protection Summit in December. This conference offers extensive training topics to further advance the knowledge base and best practices of child welfare in many critical areas.

The presentation, "Healing Early Childhood Court Families: Court Team Lessons Learned from Infancy to Toddlerhood" showcased the

unique collaboration between the Child First program and the Fifteenth Judicial Circuit's Early Childhood Court in addressing the impact of trauma experienced by families in the dependency system. Child First is an evidencebased program that utilizes a trauma-trained mental health clinician and a care coordinator to help stabilize families by linking them to needed resources in the community and helping strengthen the family. The Early Childhood Court offers monthly team meetings and frequent judicial hearings with a dedicated team and trauma informed judge who utilize creative thinking and solutions tailored to specific family needs. Permanency for the child is the primary focus. Almost forty people attended the presentation including DCF staff, service providers and foster care parents.

Achievements

CSC Achieves Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting

Seven years ago, CSC began applying to the Government Finance Officers Association for the Certificate of Achievement Award in Financial Reporting. CSC received the award for the fiscal years ended 2012, 2013, 2014, 2015, 2016 and 2017, and has just been notified that the comprehensive annual financial report for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2018 qualifies for a Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting.

The certificate of achievement is the highest form of recognition in governmental accounting and financial reporting.

Communications Update

Updated EveryParent Resource Guides now in Spanish, Creole



The popular EveryParent Resource Guide is now available in Spanish and Creole. The Spanish and Creole versions are customized to their audiences. For example, the Spanish version contains listings for Caridad Center, the Guatemalan-Maya Center and other organizations focused on serving Spanish-speakers.

Resources Guide in Spanish were delivered to 25 organizations/sites throughout Palm Beach County and the Guides in Creole were delivered to 20 organizations/sites. Organizations also can pick up the Guides at the Children's Services Council building.

Quarterly Media Expenditures Report

Per Council Resolution # 19-012 adopted June 27, 2019, the charts below summarize first quarter (Q1 – October 1, 2019, through December 31, 2019) quarterly media expenditures by Children's Services Council. Audience data are based on measurements provided by the medium to any advertiser in that medium.

Definitions:
